a. The European Council "shall elect its President, by qualified majority, for a term of two-and-a-half years, renewable once". The person selected would then have to be approved by the European Parliament."

b. "The Union shall have competence to define and implement a common foreign and security policy, including the progressive framing of a common defence policy." Member states "shall support the Union's common foreign and security policy actively and unreservedly in a spirit of loyalty and mutual solidarity."
